Congress Program and Venue

The conference will be a mixture of plenary sessions, seminars, story-telling, professional meetings and social events. IBBY's General Assembly will take place on the 10th.

The congress venue is situated in the centre of Copenhagen, 15 min. from the airport, 10 min. from the Town Hall and Central Station, canals and ramparts, the 160 year old amusement park Tivoli, numerous museums, parks, lakes, squares, etc.

Weather, Languages and Participation Fees

The Congress will take place at a time when we usually enjoy a fairly warm and sunny "late summer" (about 20 C).

The language of the congress will be English. Spanish interpretation will be provided during the plenary sessions.

Why Copenhagen?

Copenhagen is one of the most popular conference cities in the world. Located on the island of Zealand, it is a friendly, relaxed city that combines the charm of its 800 year Nordic history with the vitality of a modern metropolis. Its Danish name *København* means "merchant harbour". Copenhagen can be proud of its new Opera House and Concert



Hall; of the famous Royal Danish Ballet; of its castles, zoo and botanical garden, and the many museums: classic, contemporary and decorative art, as well as Islamic art, films, history, ethnography, labour, music, etc. All within walking distance of the congress center.

Excursions to the environs are also worthwhile, e.g. Kronborg Castle, the alleged home of Prince Hamlet, the home of Karen Blixen, and the Viking Ships Museum.

A day-tour by bus to Hans Christian Andersen's birthplace and museum is available on the 11th.

Also a *post-congress excursion by boat to Oslo*, incl. a mini-seminar at the IBBY Documentation Centre of Books for Young People, is available.

Accommodation

Copenhagen offers all kinds of accomodation, ranging from small family hotels to five-star luxury hotels, and from B&B and camping sites to hostels, with a corresponding range of prices. The atmosphere is friendly and pleasant.

Hostels start from about 20 Eur, excl. breakfast.

The restaurants in Copenhagen offer food of kitchens from most parts of the world. It is easy to get a meal at prices as low as 7 Euro, excl. beverages.

All prices include VAT (25%) and service charges. Tipping is not expected.
